## Retirement Living Abuse Prevention and Response Strategy

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## **DEFINITION**

The World Health Organisation defines elder abuse as a single or repeated act (or lack of appropriate action) occurring within any relationship where there is an expectation of trust, which causes harm or distress to an older person.

Elder abuse can take various forms such as physical, psychological or emotional, sexual and financial misconduct. It can also be the result of intentional or unintentional neglect. In NSW, data indicates that the most common forms of elder abuse are psychological and financial, and the most common perpetrators are the children of the older person. Whiddon delivers high quality, focussed services to all its residents and as part of those services aim to identify and assist those residents who staff believe are at risk of elder abuse. Research indicates that barriers in identifying or assisting residents in this area include:

- > Victims of elder abuse can be reluctant to speak to staff about elder abuse;
- Not all staff have the knowledge and skills to effectively identify and respond to elder abuse; and
- > Older people do not always know their legal rights and where to find help.
